### What is Sociology?

Sociology is the study of society, people and behaviour. Sociology is an evidence-based researchled social science which covers a wide range of topics and theories.

The course aims to develop students' understanding of human behaviour and the workings of society. The A level specification includes topics such as education, beliefs in society, families, households and crime and deviance.

## Assessment

A Level – two year course	
Paper 1 – Education and Theory Methods Students will study Education, Methods in context, and Theories and Methods.	2 hour written exam 80 marks 33.3% of the A level
Paper 2 – Topics in Sociology Option one: Students will study one topic from either Culture and Identity or Health. Option two: Students will study one topic from either Beliefs in Society or The Media	2 hour written exam 80 marks 33.3% of A level
<b>Paper 3</b> – Students will study Crime and Deviance plus Theory and Methods.	2 hour written exam 80 marks 33.3% of A level
